What opportunities do digital scholarship tools and platforms offer researchers at interdisciplinary institutions such as the Max Planck Institute for Legal History and Legal Theory? This workshop will introduce you to the concepts, tools, and best practices for creating open-access digital publications. We will explore two major open-source platforms: Manifold Publishing (developed by the University of Minnesota Press) and Quire (developed by the Getty). Storytelling is a powerful tool for communication and education. ArcGIS StoryMaps and OpenTour Builder are web-based platform that allows you to create compelling and informative stories using maps, text, images, videos, audio files, and interactive elements. It is a versatile tool that makes it easy to create interactive stories with maps as a central element, and can be used for research projects, class assignments, or public scholarship.

Whether you want to establish an online presence for your research, professional activities, or class projects, personal websites are an ideal way to bring your scholarship to a broader audience. In this workshop we will be thinking through page structure, content, and themes in WordPress, hosting/domain and everything else you need to know to get started. We will also cover how to apply web accessibility standards to online content—ensuring your materials are clear, navigable, and usable for all users, including those with disabilities.

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
